
Undivided Attention On The Mission to our World



Congregation: Amen






NICENE CREED

M: Lift up your hearts.



Distribution helps:

Morrison Location: 2 individual cups of white grape juice are available in each tray for those who prefer/need to have a nonalcohol alternative to wine. Gluten free wafers are also available. Hold your hand palm down to let the server know you would like the gluten free wafer.

Shirley Location: one individual cup of purple grape juice is available in each tray for those who prefer/need to have a nonalcohol alternative to wine. There are gluten free combination cups also available on the distribution table. Take one from the table if you would like the gluten-free combination cups that has both a gluten-free wafer on one side and wine on the other. DRIVE IN WORSHIPPERS: If you'd like communion today, please turn on your hazard lights ◀▶ during the distribution hymn. Leave them on until after Pastor visits your car. He will bring a combination cup which contains a wafer on one side and wine on the other.

Notes on the history of our Distribution Hymn "I Hear the Savior Calling"

I Hear the Savior Calling was written by Dr John C Lawrenz (1943-2024) who served as president of Michigan Lutheran Seminary, as president Dr. Martin Luther College, as Vice President of Student Life at Martin Luther College, taught at Wiscosin Lutheran Seminary and helped start Asia Lutheran Seminary where he served as president. He was a gifted preacher and expert in the Old Testament and heart for sharing the gospel.


Dr. Lawrenz wrote this hymn for a 1970 Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary Mission Festival just days after his first daughter, Ruth, passed away. Her brief life and Dr Lawrenz's mission mindedness inspired this hymn. The original stanzas ended with the phrase "Each call's a call for me" to punctuate the message of the Mission Festival. The stanzas match the Seminar's 5 day focus with each stanza emphasizing the theme of the day. Stanzas one and seven are the introductory and concluding stanzas respectively. Stanzas two through six carry out the theme of the five Mission Seminar days:

- 1. A call of challenge
- 2. A call to prospects
- 3. A call for members
- 4. A call with others.
- 5. A call among many

Excerpt from the 1970 Mission Seminar Publication

Mission work is often thought of in exotic terms - foreign lands, far-away places, men with different skins and different customs. Even here in the U.S.A. the average Lutheran in the W.E.L.S. thinks of mission work as the job of the Synod, somehow remote from his church and his life. Mission Seminar '70 took issue with such thinking. It selected as its topic grass-roots mission work, better known to all of us as evangelism. All mission work is personal; one man sharing the Gospel with another. This is the best service we Christians can render to the world in an age that cries out for the Church to be active and to speak to the needs of people. And this work is not just the Synod's job. Each pastor has his call to do mission work, no matter what the circumstances of his call. In the same way this work is not just the work of the pastor. Each Christian has the joyous duty to share Christ no matter what his vocation, his talents, his means, or his age. EVERY CALL IS A MISSION CALL! This became the chosen theme of Mission Seminar '70.



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PERSONAL PREPARATION FOR HOLY COMMUNION

Q: What does God tell me about myself in his holy Word?

A: He says that I am a sinner and deserve only his punishment.

Q: What should I do if I am not aware of my sins or am not troubled by them?

A: I should examine myself according to the Ten Commandments and ask how well I have carried out my responsibilities as a husband or wife or single person, as a parent or child, an employer or employee, a teacher or student. Have I loved God with all my heart, gladly heard his Word, and patiently endured affliction? Have I been disobedient, proud, or unforgiving? Have I been selfish, lazy, envious, or quarrelsome? Have I lied or deceived, taken something not mine, or given anyone a bad name? Have I abused my body or permitted indecent thoughts to linger in my mind? Have I failed to do what is right and good?

Q: When I realize that I have sinned against God and deserve his punishment, what should I do?

A: I will confess before God all my sins, those which I remember as well as those of which I am unaware. I will pray to God for his mercy and forgiveness.

Q: How do I receive his gracious forgiveness?

A: His Word assures me that Jesus led a pure and holy life for me and died on the cross for me to pay the full price for all my sins. Through faith in Jesus, I have been clothed in my Savior's perfect righteousness and holiness.

Q: What further assurance do I have that Jesus is mine and I am his?

A: In Holy Communion he gives me his body and blood together with the bread and wine as a truly life-giving food and drink to unite me with him and my fellow believers. By means of this sacrament, Jesus not only forgives my sins but sweeps away all my doubts about his love for me, gives me his own strength to live a God-pleasing life, and grants me a joyful foretaste of heaven.

Q: How can I be sure that I receive all these blessings in the Lord's Supper?

A: I have his own word spoken as his last will and testament on the night before he died. There he tells me: "Take and eat; this is my body. Drink from it, all of you; this is my blood which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this in remembrance of me."

Q: How will I respond to this priceless gift from Jesus?

A: I will daily thank and praise him for his love to me. With his help I will fight temptation, do my best to correct whatever wrongs I have done, and serve him and those around me with love and good works.

Lord Jesus, with joy and gratitude I now come to your table to receive the precious food of your life-giving body and blood. May it strengthen me to remain in you as you remain in me, so that I bear much fruit in devoted service to you and in acts of kindness to others. Amen.

Some History about Asia Lutheran Seminary

Twenty years ago, <u>Asia Lutheran Seminary (ALS)</u> officially opened its doors in Hong Kong to train Chinese-speaking pastors and evangelists. Today, thanks to God's grace and your generous support, ALS is equipping church leaders from across Asia-Oceania and around the world.



From its beginnings as a seminary for Hong Kong and East Asia, ALS has grown into a truly regional seminary with hubs in both Hong Kong and Chiang Mai, Thailand. ALS now supports theological education efforts in more than 18 countries and reaches students across four continents.

Here are just a few ways your support is impacting gospel work through ALS:

- Training more national leaders: Many ALS graduates now serve as instructors, professors, and church leaders. Two full-time faculty members—Dr. Angus Cheung and Prof. William Zhu—are national pastors who model ALS' belief that local Asian leaders will serve as the best teachers.
- **Expanding programs for more students:** ALS' program structure allows students to earn certificates, diplomas, and degrees that fit their gospel ministry goals and life stage. Programs like the <u>TELL</u> certificate integrate flexible online learning and are offered in both English and Mandarin.
- Reaching the Chinese-speaking diaspora: Over the past several years, many Christians have emigrated from Hong Kong. ALS has followed them with gospel training, now serving students in places like New Zealand, Australia, and the U.K.
- Launching new regional efforts: ALS' Regional Theological Education Program (RTEP) supports theological education programs across Asia-Oceania, helping build sustainable, confessional Lutheran training with partner churches.
- **Building a new generation of leaders**: ALS' online presence, global faculty, and strategic partnerships mean that more people—lay leaders, pastors, and teachers—can grow in the Word and share Christ in their communities.

From the first worship service in 2005 to the <u>20th anniversary celebration on June 1</u>, ALS has remained committed to one mission: preparing Christians to serve as leaders of confessional Lutheran groups across Asia-Oceania. The celebration in Hong Kong not only marked two decades of blessings but was also a launchpad for what comes next..
